# Grand Western Greenway

The Grand Western Greenway proposal is a plan to create a 13-kilometer long, traffic -free path between Wellington and Taunton in Somerset, UK. The path would follow the route of the Grand Western Canal, a historic waterway that was built in the early 19th century and closed in the late 19th century. The canal is now dry in most parts, but its route can still be traced in the landscape. The old canal passes through Langford Budville Parish close to the river but this part is not currently in the plans. However, it would link directly into the Bridgwater – Taunton canal thus providing a traffic-free path almost 20 miles long.

The proposal aims to provide a safe and scenic alternative for active travel, such as walking and cycling. It would also promote the heritage and wildlife of the canal corridor, which is rich in history and biodiversity. The proposal is supported by various partners and stakeholders, including the *Friends of the Grand Western Canal, the Wellington Wheelers Cycling Club, Greenways and Cycle Routes Ltd, Somerset Council*, and other active travel organisations.

The proposal has been submitted to Somerset Council and Stantec, a consultancy firm that is conducting a feasibility study for the project.

The proposal document can be downloaded from the Grand Western Greenway website where more information about the project can also be found. The website also invites people to get involved in the campaign by signing up as supporters, attending events, or contacting the organizers. The Grand Western Greenway Association hopes to raise funds and awareness for the project and to make it a reality in the near future. **grandwesterngreenway.co.uk** 

The Grand Western Greenway Association is conducting guided walks on the route wherever possible along public rights of way once a month: Saturday 18 November, Sunday 10 December and Saturday 20 January. All are welcome to join these.

The Old Oak directed by Ken Loach.

We were due to show Oppenheimer on 18<sup>th</sup> November, but as I was writing this we were told that the release date had been put back so a change to our schedule has been made. *The Old Oak* is set in a small town near Durham, whose focal centre is the titular pub. Landlord TJ Bannatyne (Dave Turner) is struggling to stay afloat during economic uncertainty. As the film begins, the town, previously a mining community that has now plunged into poverty, faces



rising tension when Syrian refugees are placed in local homes. While this is met with hostility by the locals, Bannatyne forges a relationship with Yara (Ebla Mari), one of the refugees, and her family, as they organize a food initiative to help the town community. What really stands out the most in the film is the humanity that shines throughout. It is a beautiful reminder of what a community is and can be, regardless of country of origin, religion, or skin colour.

# December 16 And Then Come The Nightjars

A heart-warming story of friendship and survival set against the backdrop of the 2001 Foot and Mouth outbreak. An unlikely friendship develops between a Devon farmer and the vet who is assigned to cull his precious herd. Anyone who lived in this area in 2001 will remember the eerie emptiness of the countryside with no animals in the fields.

Budvue tickets are still only £5 and doors open at 7pm with the main film at 7.30pm, the bar is open and ice-creams are available during the interval.



### FERMENTED GREEN TOMATOES

Ingredients

4 cups of water

2 tbsps fine sea salt

750g green tomatoes cut into wedges if large or left whole if small.

3-4 chillies halved lengthways

6 garlic cloves, peeled and left whole

Vine leaves or fig leaves or medium clean pebbles



### Method

Warm the water and salt in a saucepan to dissolve the salt and create a brine

Set aside and allow to cool

Pack the tomatoes chillis and garlic cloves into sterilised jars

Pour over the brine, topping up with water to completely submerge the tomatoes.

Tuck the leaves into the top of the jars to ensure that the tomatoes are completely covered or place your clean pebbles on the top.

Seal the jars

Allow the tomatoes to ferment for at least 14 days and up to 6 weeks. Taste the tomatoes periodically and when they are sour enough for your liking, transfer them to the fridge where they will keep for at least 6 months.

### What to do with green tomatoes?

Obviously, you can make green tomato chutney but if you are like us and not great chutney eaters, it does seem like a bit of a waste. I found this recipe this October for Fermented Green Tomatoes and it seemed to tick all the boxes. Rich in probiotics like sauerkraut and kimchi, they are allegedly delicious eaten with salads, cold cuts and cheese. A few years ago, I fermented green cherry tomatoes and used them very much like capers, adding a sharpness and piquant taste to stews and pasta dishes and they were very successful. This recipe uses wedges of large green tomatoes although there is absolutely no reason why you shouldn't use cherry tomatoes if that's all you've got. I have used large mayonnaise or gherkin jars as I didn't have proper fermentation jars. If you do the same, please make sure that you 'burp' the jars at least daily to release the carbon dioxide which builds up as a natural byproduct of fermentation. If you don't do this, you run the risk of exploding jars!

At the time of going to print, they are still not quite ready to eat but so far so good! I plan on writing an update later in the year so watch this space!

# Monday 6 November and Monday 20 November Meet at the Jubilee Seat at 10am

In a Round About article in March 2021, the suggestion was made that acorns, collected from the Common and grown on, might be returned to fill the gaps left by ash die-back. This autumn that is exactly what will happen, with the Forest School children planting young oaks under the supervision of the Wildlife Trust.

But the suggestion was also made that the acorns might sprout not just green shoots but green ideas. Since then, there has been a healthy growth of sustainable activities: a Greener Gardening Group holding meetings in the pub and elsewhere; a wildflower area on the Triangle with currently over 90 mostly locally sourced species; a conservation group now meeting twice monthly; Café Plus recently linking up with Wellington Repair Cafe; eight WhatsApp groups on wildlife, parish plants, Trash to Treasure and other topics and a great community effort to plant 600 trees and 300 hedging plants on land offered by the Hendy family to create a Jubilee Wood.

The wood is now benefiting from management - strimming and weeding mostly - by many of the original planters. There have been some failures but the bird cherry

illustrated has grown 2.4 metres in 10 months. It will be a long-term job and anyone

who would like to help but cannot make the regular conservation group dates should please let me know and we can fix a time.

In addition to these groups which sprang from the Greener Langford Budville project we also have social groups from the Friendship Group and Langford Ladies to the

Baby and Toddler Group. It all amounts to a community worth celebrating.

# Green fingers AUTUMNAL THOUGHTS AND TASKS

I always think of this as the **beginning of the gardening year** as it's now you set the garden up for next year and make your plans for the perfect veg and flowers all of course untouched by pest, disease or unhelpful weather! So take stock of what has worked this year and what hasn't, get rid of stuff you are disappointed with and if a plant group has worked well for you think of adding to it.

**Divide your herbaceous perennials** if they're becoming dead in the middle to rejuvenate them, spread them around the garden if you would like more of them or give them to a friend or pop them in the compost if you've enough.

"Dying well" seems to be an in-phrase, which means, "Do your seed heads look good?" If they do, leave them for the birds and to look wonderful with the frost on them in the morning. If they don't, cut them back to the ground. Which brings us to another new idea. Previously we were advised to clear away the material to the compost heap and "tidy up", now the expression "chop and drop" is being used. So you chop the dead stems up small and leave them as mulch around the plant. This

won't suit everyone's tastes as to how a garden should look and also any diseased material should definitely be removed.

In the light of consistently very dry springs, now is definitely the time to plant any new trees and shrubs, remembering to stake them well and give them a good drink and mulch to get started.

Also, now is the time to **move any perennials** that are in the wrong place in the garden; too tall, the wrong colour or need more sun, more shade etc.

The bulb catalogues are here and so inviting, so **get planting.** All but the tulips go in now, they go in later.



# Green Fingers AUTUMNAL THOUGHTS AND TASKS (cont)

Onions, garlic and autumn broad beans should go in.

Any **frost sensitive plants** need bringing in or covering with a good mulch for protection. We divided our ginger lily last year and planted one in the garden and kept one in the conservatory and they both flowered at exactly the same time! So were we lucky with the frost? And shall we risk it again? The same dilemma is true

for dahlias to lift or mulch?

If you've got some **summer herbs**, pot some up now and bring them in to a sheltered porch or windowsill: they should go on for a bit longer for you (see over).

With the cooler nights we're bringing in the last of the peppers and tomatoes to ripen indoors and looking forward to the transition to winter vegetables. (There is only so much ratatouille you can eat!) However, now is the time to **order any vegetable seeds** for next year to ensure you get the varieties you love to grow and while there's a chance of remembering what quantities of each thing you actually need.

# Visit to Blue Shed Flowers

Thanks to organisers Jackie, Chris and Sarah of the LB Greener Gardening Group, a small group of us enjoyed an outing to Blue Shed Flowers, a local artisan grower and florist (<u>blueshedflowers.co.uk</u>) run by Jan Boddington, near Wiveliscombe. Our convoy journey got 're-routed' by an 'up-rooted' tree blocking our descent into the valley, which led us further around diddy lanes into the depths of the countryside. Finally arriving, we were enthusiastically welcomed by Jan, suitably clad in waterproof and wellies for the now inclement weather, for our tour of her three acre riverside plot on the Somerset-Devon border.

Jan's passion is infectious, as she's created a wonderful display and source of colourful seasonal flowers and shrubs growing wildly and abundantly, in their natural harsh rural habitat. Her key aim is to work in the most sustainable ways, both in terms of growing methods and floristry practice. She so enjoys continually enhancing her field and the process of planning, sourcing seeds and plants, sowing, growing, tending and foraging. All the stock grown on her land, is handpicked by her with little need to buy in - but if needs must she supports local growers to guarantee provenance. It all evolved over years of enjoyment planting shrubs, interplanted with perennials and annuals grown from seed. She continues to learn from nature's responses and continually adapts and experiments to enhance the natural beauty of the flowers to trigger our senses in her artistic creations. Jan's inspiration is taken from the seasons of landscape around her. Having trained in fine art, her awareness of form, colour, structure and texture, is replicated in her unique bespoke flower arrangements, bouquets and installations for any occasion. She also runs workshops to share her knowledge and love of creating "flowers on the wild side". Jan is often seen at Wivvy Market russling up amazing bouquets from a bucket of gorgeous seasonal flowers and shubbery - as a grateful recipient, I loved the natural, wild and unique structure of my spontaneously purchased bouquet.

As the heavens were relentless, we bedraggled enthusiasts scuttled into the shelter of the polytunnel where we learned more about planting from seeds (and another use for 'doggie poo bags') as we gathered seeds to try out at home! Many tips were shared and ideas explored with emphasis on sustainability. Finally, we were kindly invited back to Jan's home to warm up and dry out with a hot drink and biscuits and much gardening chatter. We presented her with a small donation which she kindly wished to donate to Shelterbox - a very fitting gesture. We were very grateful to Jan for sharing her passion and knowledge in her wild oasis, where nature was truely experienced!
