- * to install solar panels on the roof together with a battery in the boiler room so that bills are reduced and the Hall is less exposed to volatile energy costs. With this work we also plan for the Hall to provide emergency power to the community in the event of grid outages.

LB Parish Council Update Road Traffic Options

Road traffic invariably creates untold problems from speeding, congestion, emissions etc., but it is a necessary evil to allow us to live our lives with the mobility we often crave. Unfortunately, an unintended consequence has been a number of incidents where large HGV's have found themselves in wholly inappropriate places in both Runnington and Langford Budville causing damage to hedges and residents' properties.

For some time we have, with the invaluable help of Somerset Councillor David Mansell, been in direct discussion with the County's traffic management team to try to eradicate these problems. We recently received a communication from the TM team, which I have broken down into headlines to show the many actions that are being submitted to the appropriate Council departments:

- 1. Install two "unsuitable for HGV signs" a lorry symbol with line throughon the Runnington junction of the B3187, and the village hall junction along Langford Common Road, plus improved width restrictions signage.
- 2. Refresh all faded lining in Langford Budville, including yellow bar markings, roundels, slows and junctions.
- 3. Upgrade school signage by the flashing warning lights.

I hope you all agree this is a big step forward, which has taken almost nine months of persistence to get the necessary agreement.

I'm sure you remember that we sought the views of our residents regarding whether we should introduce a 20's plenty scheme. The overwhelming feeling was that this would be desirable, and the outcome of that survey can be seen in our community now. The main issue with any such scheme is it is advisory only, however, we have begun discussions with the County Council to see if it is possible to make the 20mph speed limit official. We understand there will be a cost involved. We will look to move forward if it is felt to be financially achievable.

Also, we are beginning to look at possible improvements to the B3187 Wivey Road for better speed management, primarily near the children's play area. We will update you once we have more news on the subject.

At our meeting on 4th July we welcomed the gynaecological oncologist Dr. David Milliken from Musgrove Hospital. The setting up of the Somerset post-menopausal bleeding self-referral scheme, the first of it's kind in the country, has been a great success. Wellington Cottage Hospital has been chosen as one of seven cottage hospitals in the county to have a specialist clinic. People registered with a GP can contact this service online or by phone and this has enabled waiting times to see a specialist drop from 63 to 5 days. Dr Milliken also touched on other aspects of cancer care such as the emotional impact for the patient and their family. The discussion also covered the current problems facing the NHS such as funding, staffing and the impacts of increasing obesity.

This was a sobering but much needed and informative talk as all members of a family are often affected by a patients' cancer diagnosis and we were left feeling much more hopeful about what could happen to us should we be impacted in the future.

Considerate parking-again!

We are having increasing safety issues, particularly with school related parking at Swifts and the area immediately surrounding the school. It was brought to our attention that the local PCSO Victoria isn't receiving any/many official complaints, reports of illegal parking and requests for a presence during school drop off and collection times. It's been made apparent that it is important to record and report those incidents and issues so that Victoria can better serve the community by allocating her time and having sufficient evidence to act in a legal capacity.

As has been mentioned in previous editions, we are very concerned about emergency access and the safety of the residents and school children due to obstructions caused by poor parking.

We would like to encourage residents to come forward and report to Victoria (Victoria.Henderson@avonandsomerset.police.co.uk Tel 07889659476) ideally with pictures, any issues they are facing relating to poor and illegal parking, such as parking on the foot paths, vehicles causing obstructions, parking on the yellow markings around the school, so that she can hopefully take action and improve the situation for all residents.

No-stir Courgette Risotto

Ingredients
250g Risotto rice
100g Parmesan cheese grated
Juice of one lemon

1 medium onion chopped 700ml stock

2 medium/large courgettes Tablespoon olive oil Torn basil leaves



Method

Heat the oven to 200 degrees (fan 180)

Slice one courgette, brush with oil and arrange in a single layer on baking tray and cook in oven for about 20 - 25 minutes until cooked and just starting to brown. Meanwhile soften the onions in oil in an ovenproof dish.

Grate the second courgette and add to the onion for a couple of minutes stirring. Add the rice and fry for a minute stirring.

Add the lemon juice and stock and bring to the boil.

Put in the oven with the lid on for 20 minutes, stirring once halfway through. Add Parmesan and stir through.

Replace lid and leave to stand for 5 minutes.

Add baked courgette slices to the top with some basil and serve.

Ingredients
500 g Courgettes
½ tsp salt
40g plain flour
½ tsp baking powder
20g fine polenta or cornmeal
4 spring onions

2 eggs beaten Nutmeg 100g feta cheese or parmesan 15g fresh herbs (dill, basil, parsley) A good pinch of chilli flakes (optional) Olive oil for frying

Method (Fritters cont.)

Grate the courgettes coarsely and sprinkle with salt. Set aside for 20 mins

Mix the flour, baking powder and cornmeal in a large bowl

Finely chop the spring onions

When the 20 mins is up, place the courgettes in a clean tea towel and squeeze out all the liquid.

Add to the bowl with the flour.


Add the remaining ingredients and stir well.

Form into flatish burger patties

Heat the oil in a large frying pan and fry the patties for 5 mins on each side or until golden brown and crispy.

Serve with a green salad and a squeeze of lemon (or sweet chilli sauce, if that's your desire!)

Visit to Tom Neilson's private garden

Since the GGG began as part of the Greener LB initiative, the talks and visits have been..... miscellaneous. But on July 7th we went to Tom Neilson's garden in the wild country north of Milverton which was green gardening in front of our eyes.

Tom's gardening business is called Biocentric but his garden is not normally open to the public. Inspiring photographs are on the inside cover.



Tom's philosophy is only to grow and sell plants that look after themselves after planting. This style of gardening with "chop and drop" and "right plant right place", with no watering or feeding, makes for a very resilient, low maintenance garden. His plants get one watering on planting, and he even knocks off some of the pot compost so that the roots will move out into the soil. In this garden, the soil is sand and gravel and very free draining, so if it works there.....

It helps to have Tom's knowledge of plant families, including the exact location of their wild counterparts; choosing the right spot for your choice to thrive is all part of the skill. A lot has been written about the present drought. We are going to have to change our lifestyles; we can start in the garden.

Greener gardening surely includes its wildlife benefits, as well as sustainability. Something else we learned: did you know that plants in the Willowherb family are a foodstuff for the Elephant Hawk Moth?

Be still - a message from our curate

It's not uncommon for my journeys to be delayed as I travel between our village churches. Not long ago, I found myself stuck behind a pair of a cyclists taking a leisurely pace down a narrow country lane. You know the sort of moment—running late, no way to overtake, nothing to do but wait. Resigned to my fate, a line from Psalm 46 came to mind, "Be still, and know that I am God." (Psalm 46:10)

Stillness is not something we're particularly good at these days. Even in our rural setting where the pace of life might seem gentler, the pressures of modern living still reach us. We fill our days with activities, commitments, notifications, scrolling—our minds racing even when our bodies are still.

Busyness tends to breed isolation. I have found that the busier my life becomes, and the more rushed my schedule is, the more disconnected I feel from those around me. The temptation is to speed up in pursuit of an elusive future plateau of pace. If I can get more done now, then next week. next month.. next year.. will be easier.

But God's invitation isn't to do more. It's to stop, to be still. And in that stillness, to remember who we are, and know who He is. We are not defined by our busyness, but as part of the community of creation; belonging in the balance of the world, inherently loved and known by our Creator, connected to the world around us and each other.

Scripture often speaks of rest not as idleness, but as restoration. Stillness is about becoming present. Psalm 46 speaks of tumult: of quaking earth and roaring seas. Yet, in the middle of all that noise, God calls us to stillness. Not escape, but attentiveness. Not passivity, but connection.

Those moments when we're forced to pause—a traffic delay, a lack of phone signal, even a late-running friend—can feel inconvenient. But perhaps they are holy invitations. Opportunities to step back from the rush, to look up, to breathe, and to remember that we are not the centre of the universe but we are cherished by the One who is.

So the next time life presses pause—whether by choice or by circumstance—perhaps it's not a delay at all. Perhaps it's a quiet nudge from God: "Be still... and know."

Days out from Langford Budville:

Five Go Off To Watchet!

Have you ever been on the West Somerset Railway? Well, we hadn't although we had seen the little train puffing along the beach at Dunster and often idly talked about taking a little trip but had never got any further. So, when Alby's brother and his family visited from New Zealand, it seemed the perfect opportunity to explore the countryside from the comfort of a vintage steam train!

The train runs from Bishops Lydeard all the way to Minehead but we decided to start our journey from the sweet little station at Crocombe on the Quantocks. Do give yourself enough time to take a look round the perfectly preserved 1930's station with its old metal signs and beautifully cared for garden. You can even have a cup of tea or an ice cream as you drink in the surroundings!

There are a number of different carriages, including a dining car but we chose to sit in a six- seater compartment with a sliding door onto a corridor. The vintage vibe continued, with luggage racks above the bench seating and grey conical shaped metal wall lights. It was a beautiful sunny day and the journey of about 20 minutes,



allowed us to take in the Quantocks scenery from the window before culminating in a view of the sea as the train chugged along the coastline.

On our arrival in Watchet, we headed for Chives tearooms for scones and jam and hot buttered teacakes served with very good coffee. Suitably replenished, we had a browse in the excellent interiors shop, 'Perfectly Lovely Interiors', before exploring the little museum on the quay which was fascinating. A history of Watchet dating back several hundred years and a wide ranging

collection of exhibits including some very large fossils was an ideal place to spend another hour.

We left the museum and followed the quay through the Marina and had a quick browse in the art gallery and rather lovely and eclectic gift shop before walking over the headland to Donniford Beach. This is part of the South West Coastal path and is a beautiful walk, with far reaching views out to sea. Whilst not far, there are some steps to climb up and down, so please bear this in mind if you are visiting with friends who are not so fleet of foot. Within 20 minutes walk, you arrive at the



steps down onto the rocky Doniford beach with its rock pools and surprising very large ammonites embedded in the shore. We took our time to really explore the beach which was not busy with just a few dog walkers.

We wandered back along the coastal path and decided to get some Fish and Chips from the chippy next to the museum and sat in the sunshine outside The Esplanade on the quay. Very obligingly, this pub permits this as long as you clear up the rubbish and order a drink. We decided it would be very rude not to! So cold pints of cider were the order of the day as we ate our Fish and Chips – bliss!

We paid £22 each for a return ticket from Crocombe to Watchet. It is also worth

noting that Alby's niece has autism so her mother travelled free as her carer and all the staff were attentive and accommodating.

All in all, it was a very nice day out and just a short drive from LB. So when you are wondering what to do, why not get the train to the coast?



Bus News

No.27 timetable changes - There will be a change to the 27 route in September and it will start at Langford Budville instead of Wellington. We are awaiting details of the new timetable. There will be some adjustments to the 25 timetable too.



Milverton – there have been problems in Milverton with traffic flow, road closures, badly parked vehicles etc. with buses arriving in Milverton too early, owing to the allowance on the timetable of 17 minutes between Wivey & Milverton – this issue has been reported and it is hoped adjustments will be made in the September timetable.

Wiveliscombe road closures - The 27 should be as normal with the current Church street closures in Wiveliscombe, apart from being a couple of minutes late due to going via Ford Road and Northgate to North St and the town centre.

Future Campaigns - Campaigns after September 2025 in time for possible changes in April 2026 are as follows:

•An afternoon service for the 27 •Better services for students. There is a bus service between Welly and Richard Huish in the mornings and afternoons – could this be extended to Langford Budville, Milverton & Wivey? •An evening 25 bus from Taunton – the last bus home at 5.40 is far too early.




