Round About needs your help

This is an urgent request from the editorial team: **we are going to need your help** if we are to keep our little magazine going. If you think you might be able to contribute to Round About in any way, <u>please get</u> in touch with us. I will be moving to Wales next year, and we must begin succession planning. For the last eight years I have, originally with Marilyn Lilley who designed the magazine, prepared the copy for printing every month. It requires some degree of computer skills as well as a good working knowledge of correct written English. The current team have many of these skills but we are all busy and lead demanding lives. We are all volunteers, and we really need more help.

The magazine is assembled for printing in **Microsoft Publisher**. For anyone who is familiar with the Microsoft Office family this should not be difficult to learn. I should be able to train you as long as you are competent with Word/Excel/PowerPoint etc. And before you ask, no, we can't do it in Word: it simply does not have sufficient flexibility. Please, if you know Publisher, Photoshop (or any other good layout program like Adobe InDesign), and think you could help, do get in touch. The more people on the team the less work for each!

We also need help with organising distribution, fetching the magazine from the printers, writing articles, page design and illustrations, so even if you aren't particularly adept on the computer we'd love to hear from you.

Most of the **photos** used over the years on the cover and inside are mine, so we'll need to get input from the photographers amongst you. We can set up a central file online (Dropbox or icloud) where you can post photos for the team. We attribute any used on the cover or in articles (but not the collage). Remember, people photos do require subject permission. Photos should be fairly high resolution, local, seasonal or topical. For the <u>cover</u> they need to be in portrait format (or crop to that format) and preferably with a top and bottom section for the titles that's not too busy.

The Round About design has not changed in eight years so perhaps it is time for a new look: any ideas for this and for what should be included are very welcome.

Financially, **Round About** is sound, with advertising income covering the cost of printing with a small excess for stationery and stamps. We have not raised our rates since we started!

If you would like to join the **Round About** team, or have some suggestions for how Round About should continue, please in the first instance contact me, and try and come along to one of our planning meetings in the New Year. Different perspectives are very helpful and all suggestions welcome. Thank you!

Planting the Jubilee Wood

Middle Hill Farm (Langford Lakes)

Saturday 14th and Sunday 15th January 2023

You will not want to miss this event! Come with family and friends at a time-slot of your choice. You might want to spend an hour or more and plant up to 20 trees. Bring refreshments to share and spades to make slots for small, bareroot saplings. Virtually no digging involved but there will need to be tree shelters - ugly but essential to protect against deer and rabbits. About a quarter of these are biodegradable as an experiment.

There are 600 trees and 200 shrubs to be planted, most of which we hope to plant on the Saturday, with Sunday morning available for those who would prefer that.

It's in a field on the **Langford Lakes** farm (and with the Hendy family's close involvement) next to **Bindon Lane**, just on the left as you would leave with your Christmas tree. We would love it to be a whole village event involving lots of children who might one day say, "I planted that!"

I have a list of about 60 potential volunteers whom I will contact just after this issue of Round About appears. If you think you may not be on that list and would like to be, please contact me. There will need to be a booking slot system to avoid queueing.

Somerset Bus Partnership Welcomes Flat Rate Fare Proposals

Somerset Bus Partnership welcomes the Government's plan to provide up to $\pounds60$ million to enable bus operators to cap single adult bus fares at £2. The £2 flat fare comes in **from the beginning of January and will continue through to end March 2023**. Most bus operators are expected to adopt the scheme.

Our School

Langford Budville Church of England Primary School is looking for people in the Community to become School Governors.

As a governor you will be a volunteer who makes a vital contribution to the success of the school. We invite applications from anyone who is interested in helping the school be the best it can be, and full training and support is available.

We are looking for someone who can attend approximately ten full governing body meetings per year. Meetings are held in school, usually on Tuesday evenings from around 6pm to 8pm. Governors also spend time in school during the day (around two morning or afternoon visits per term).

School governors have three main roles.

- Governors ensure clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction.

 The governing body helps to set long-term plans for the school, decide where improvements need to be made and how to make them.
- Governors hold the headteacher to account for the educational performance of the school and the effective and efficient performance management of staff. The governing body looks at the quality of education being offered and ensures the head is doing everything possible to improve results.
- Governors oversee the financial performance of the school and make sure its money is well spent. Governors examine budgets and spending proposals to monitor whether the school is getting value for money and ensure the money is spent in the right areas.

You must be 18 or over to apply and all governors must have Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) checks.

Langford Budville Community Fund

Greener Langford Budville: Ways forward

About 40 people came to the Jubilee Hall to learn more about the recent **Biodiversity** and **Low-Carbon Travel** studies and to discuss how to take initiatives forward to practical plans. We were delighted that Anita Roy from **Transition Town Wellington** chaired the discussion. Councillor David Mansell from Wiveliscombe and Nick Girone-Maddocks also attended, and contributed to the discussion on **reducing our carbon footprints** following a presentation on the topic by lan Loudon. The information in this article is focussed on enabling you to find out more on the topics and whom to contact to get involved. A safe cycle-way to Wellington

Juliet Shrimpton has led the drive to enable us to get out of our cars safely. The Somerset County Council grant to travel consultants has resulted in a preferred potential cycle route using the road from the triangle to Runnington together with a new cycle path adjacent to the B3187 from Runnington junction to Tonedale. The estimated cost was £310k (2022) with the bulk of that money required for the dedicated offroad path. The big issues are around management of vehicles to make the Runnington road safe and making sure that diverted traffic does not make existing problem areas in the parish worse. The report has already been distributed to local councils to help pursue funding and maintain support for necessary Highways inputs. However, there is still plenty to do locally to ensure the best and quickest outcomes to make a safe route to Wellington from Langford Budville for cyclists and walkers. Signage, traffic calming measures, speed limits and car sharing were all discussed as potential contributions to positive change. Biodiversity audit – maximising our potential

The report that Hannah Montag presented is rich with parish maps illustrating every possible aspect of our natural world and how we are interacting with it.

Key positive points were the substantial percentage of ancient woodland within the parish and the healthy state of the River Tone (at least up to Wellington). There is great potential to collectively manage the land and water resources to improve connectivity. There are also easy wins that could have a significant positive impact, such as reducing light brightness around the church and Swifts. Bats and reptiles are doing quite well in the parish but hedgehogs and many bird species are struggling. There is a good opportunity for anyone interested in observing particular species or habitats, such as orchards. The new Community Fund could be accessed to

add to the **Library of Things** if that were needed. **Citizen science has great potential here**. You can find like-minded parishioners at the Greener LB groups already meeting regularly and access support for new initiatives. Please share if you have any contacts with other local wildlife groups.

Reducing our carbon footprint

lan Loudon produced some very thought-provoking slides comparing our average household carbon footprint with that of nearby communities and the national average. We fare very poorly (160% national average) primarily because we have no mains gas, no shops and are relatively prosperous and thus consume more than most. A personal carbon calculator can be useful to assess the impact of changing life-style choices but the relative change is more informative than the actual number.

Improving our leaky housing would be a good start, as would generating more renewable electricity. The information on what to do in your own house is available (Centre for Alternative Technology, Centre for Sustainable Energy) but voluminous and confusing. We could do with a retrofit co-ordinator: is anyone interested in that role? Transition Town Wellington would be interested in running a shared "warm room" with accessible information on this topic. Nick Girone-Maddocks was great at explaining the current EPC (Energy Performance Certificate) system needed as part of house sales, which focusses on energy use and heat retention. Did you know current building regulations require 30cm of loft insulation?

The Jubilee Hall will be revisiting energy generation. I would be interested in being part of a group to help with house retrofitting, something in which Councillor David Mansell has considerable experience. Please get in touch. The meeting ended with the distribution of the very generous raffle prizes. Clair Care won a free EPC assessment. Hannah won £100 towards retrofitting, Louise Bancroft the White Post lunch and Tim Dyer the box of locally grown goodies.

Green Fingers: Growing Trees

Reg Hendy and his family have a long history of active support for the community of Langford Budville, including long-term sponsorship of the "Green Fingers" page of Round About. With the new Jubilee Wood to be planted on their land at Middle Hill Farm in January, it seemed a good time to celebrate this.

Reg comes from a Somerset farming family. He and Ann moved to Middle Hill Farm in 1971, starting out with only 20 acres. As an agricultural engineer, repairing tractors and agricultural machinery was an important part of Rea's business. The farm has always been run innovatively with an eye to imaginative diversification. The five acres of ponds (Langford Lakes) were originally dug between 1980 and 2000 to provide irrigation water for potatoes to enable them to be grown to a standard baked potato size. Sheds were insulated and modified to store potatoes in a controlled environment. With the move away from potatoes, the lakes were used for carp fishing for some years and are now part of the attraction of holidaying in new lodges on the farm.

Forestry was always attractive to Reg, so growing Christmas trees was a natural transition: planting started in 1991 with first sales in 1999. The 40-acre Christmas Tree Farm is now well known and has made buying the annual tree into a fun outing. There is a delightful **Christmas shop** at the farm, and the drive out is beautiful as it wends its way through the Christmas trees and through some indigenous woodland along the stream. The combination of the ponds, forestry and regenerative farming has made the farm into a wildlife haven. Roe deer occasionally eat the trees but the birds, fungi, reptiles and otters etc that are observed through the year more than make up for any damage.

Langford Lakes is very much a family business employing the skills of many different members: Reg regards himself as just the "oldest member of the team". The business has 25 local employees over the Christmas period and Reg would welcome more locally-made crafts to sell in the shop. He remains interested in innovation that keeps our community strong and diverse.

Langford Ladies - Antarctica

Our November meeting was opened to all-comers as we knew the subject was of wide interest: Saranne gave the 30 or so attendees a richly illustrated talk of her cruise taken 10 years ago in Antarctica.

The excellent cruise organisation meant the passengers could enjoy extraordinary proximity to the very rich wildlife of the icy south. From the off, the ship was trailed by a variety of sea birds including several albatross species with up to 11ft wingspans. The Falklands, South Georgia and the Antarctic peninsula between them host many species of penguin, seals and sea-lions, whales and sea birds. We saw King penguin colonies with over 100 000 birds stretching into the distance above huge numbers of elephant seal, and rock-hopper penguins nesting in amongst albatross nurseries. A particular Attenborough-like highlight was a pod of orcas coordinating their manoeuvres to unseat a leopard seal (unsuccessfully).

The geology information was fascinating with photos of "stone runs", double folded valleys and a taster of the plate tectonics and their connections with the geology of South America and southern Africa. Saranne's introduction to the vocabulary of icebergs and floes and the wild weather of the Antarctic was also very informative: katabatic winds up to 200mph and a continent that holds about 75% of the world's fresh water. The cruise followed parts of Shackleton's historic journey and the challenges he faced and thus reminded us why he is held in such awe. (Saranne managed to get her kayak stuck in the ice too!) An extraordinary, unforgiving and mesmerising continent.

Seasonal Treats - Christmas Sprouts

Christmas Sprouts with Chestnuts and Bacon

Chestnuts make a great accompaniment to Brussel sprouts. If you then add a bit of bacon too, even the most hardened Brussel sprout critics will be spooning them onto their plates.

If you are an experienced forager, you can gather your own chestnuts – there is an abundance at the moment due to it being another mast year. Otherwise, you can buy them, frozen, vacuum packed or fresh in their shells. If you buy fresh

ones, soak them in water for an hour or two for easy peeling and roast for 25 mins at 200°C (cut the shell down one side first to prevent them exploding). Let them cool, remove their shells and continue with the following recipe.

Recipe

Ingredients

1 kg Brussel sprouts trimmed 6 rashers of smoked streaky bacon cut into bite-size pieces 200 g chestnuts 50 g of butter



Method

Bring a large pan of salted water to the boil, add the Brussel sprouts and cook for five minutes, drain and run under cold water.

Heat a large frying pan, add the bacon pieces and gently fry for 10 minutes until crisp. Take the bacon out of the pan and leave the fat behind. Add the chestnuts and fry over a high heat for about five minutes until tender, stirring occasionally. Remove and set aside.

Add the Brussels sprouts to the pan with a splash of water, cover and finish cooking over a medium heat for five minutes stirring now and again.

Uncover, turn up the heat and add most of the 50g of butter and sauté for two minutes. Tip in the bacon and chestnuts, season, add the last knob of butter, serve and enjoy.

Langford Heathfield Nature Reserve: Ash dieback safety works

As I'm sure many of you are aware the UK's ash trees are very sadly being attacked by ash dieback disease. This fungal disease arrived from the continent a few years ago and is now widespread in our ash trees. The current advice from the Forestry Commission suggests that this disease will kill the majority of our ash in the next 10 to 15 years, with only 1 to 5% surviving. If this prediction proves to be correct our woodlands and countryside will look very different in a couple of decades time.

The **Somerset Wildlife Trust** policy is to try and retain as many ash as possible, as it is highly likely that even the few trees that survive will show symptoms, with dying branches etc. Unless there is a clear health and safety risk, we will not be routinely felling diseased trees. Unfortunately, many ash trees at Langford Heathfield, including some very large ones, are alongside the roads and paths, and these will have to be felled as many are showing signs of the disease.

This is not work that the Trust wishes to do, it is expensive, difficult and ecologically damaging, but in order to ensure public safety we have no choice. Across the County felling diseased ash is likely to cost us around £600.000

This ongoing safety work will continue this winter, with trees being felled in many areas where they are next to roads, paths and adjacent properties. The bulk of the felling will be at the southern end of the reserve alongside the road from the Bindon Farm entrance down towards White Post Nursery and also alongside the public footpath down towards The Cottage. At times the short nature trail within the reserve will have to be closed to allow some of the felling to take place.

The ash tree on the **Two Ashes triangle** will also have to be felled as it is now showing significant signs of the disease. This will be replaced by 2 or 3 oak saplings grown from acorns collected on the reserve two years ago: they will be planted by children from **Langford Budville Primary School**.

Very occasionally trees other than ash will also need to be felled, for example where an oak tree with significant rot at the base is growing just behind a group of roadside ash it will need to be felled at the same time as the ash, as without the ash to prevent it falling onto the road it represents a significant risk.

In order to try and retain as many ash trees as possible within the reserve we will only be felling diseased trees adjacent to the main managed paths which are marked on the information panels. We strongly advise visitors to stick to these paths and avoid the woodland areas entirely during windy weather.



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
