

Welcome ...

Early bees are out nectaring and we are planning a **Bee Walk!** You'll find some bees in the **collage** and elsewhere to help with the identification. Our **Young Buddies** are also learning about bees! We have a bit of a 'bee thing' going on in this issue.

It's also time for taking stock - with AGMs and PCC meetings at the **Hall** and the **Churches**. The **Parish Council** is looking to the future in other ways: to replacing the magnificent Ash trees that had to be removed. You can help select the replacements. **Our School** needs Governors, and the **Hall** needs some more volunteers to keep things running smoothly too.

There are lots of groups within the village that welcome new members. Langford Ladies meets monthly and is mostly social and fun, while the Friendship Circle meets every other week, with some outings and talks, but lots of Coffee and Chat. There's exercise on offer too - Short Mat bowls, Table tennis, Yoga, Dance Exercise and Pilates are all on offer at the Village Hall. For those keen to do their bit for Wildlife there's a Conservation Workgroup who help on the common and the Triangle, and a Greener Gardening Group which encourages us to garden for sustainability. We are fortunate to have on our doorsteps one of the largest nature reserves in Somerset: There are plenty of volunteering roles to be had with Somerset Wildlife Trust who run the reserve.

We also hold regular community events to which all are welcome, like **Cafe Plus, Budvue Cinema** and celebrations for events like the **Coronation**. These are all great ways for newcomers to meet their neighbours, and also for old timers to catch up. Recently a **Community Fund** was set up to help get new initiatives going - as long as it is for the benefit of the whole community.

I must repeat our plea for more help with **Round About**: We are a small team who pull together as much information of value to the community as we can. I am planning to move to Wales later this year so some more team members would be very helpful: Even if you feel you are not a writer, designer or not very tech savvy, there is still admin and distribution to be done, and we always need photos and ideas. Do think about it! It is a great team to work with, and as in most endeavours, more hands make lighter work.



Charles III Coronation

Weekend 6th, 7th and 8th May 2023

Amidst the expectation that villagers will choose to celebrate the Coronation in all sorts of ways, there are a few events being put on for collective enjoyment.





The Jubilee Hall will be open for a **Big Breakfast** from **9.00am** with options from a full-English to coffee and croissant all available. The screen will be set up to show **live coverage of the Coronation** and the plan is to have the bar open for celebratory drinks!

Sunday 7 May - The Coronation Big Lunch Street Party In the road outside The Martlet Inn – 12.00 to 14.30.

The street party will be an opportunity to share a meal with friends and neighbours - as will be happening up and down the country. We hope you will enjoy dressing up with some fun crowns for adults, children and dogs?

The road will be closed between 10am and 3pm to allow for setting up and closing down. The Jubilee Hall tables will be laid down the middle of the road and there will be a PA system with music. If you would like to help at the beginning or end of the event, you will be very welcome.

You need to **bring your own chairs**, **food and drink**, though The Martlet will be open for business. Please bring **a cake or dessert to share** together with information on the ingredients to help those with allergies. Please avoid recipes with raw egg for obvious reasons! On another practical note, The Martlet has kindly offered the use of their loos.

You may remember, that only last year, a similar event was planned for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee: the weather was awful and the party transferred to the Jubilee Hall. We hope the weather is better this time around but, if not, the backup plan is the same and the hall is (just about) big enough!

Monday 8 May - The Big Help Out.

There will be opportunities to join in this national volunteering day. The school need volunteers to help clear a strip of land behind one of the classrooms in readiness for the development of an outside sensory area. Also, there's a bit of help needed at the church. News from the Villages

Langford Budville Parish Council:

Final update re felling of ash-dieback affected trees on the Triangle. The tree surgeon we contracted to do the work spent two days removing seven Ash trees that were in a dangerous state. Several parishioners remarked on the quality of his work, and the very tidy state he had left the area. However, there are still 3 Ash trees to be removed: these will be more complicated because

they are in the wooded area, close to a main road. They will be felled later this year or early 2024. It is a huge shame to lose such magnificent trees, but unfortunately it is an absolute must that we deal with this: we have a legal responsibility to keep everyone who visits the Triangle safe. Not dealing with the issue now rather than later would have been much more expensive and potentially dangerous. On the right is an example of the effects of Ash Dieback disease on a mature tree.



Because the Triangle is covered by a **Tree Preservation Order**, planning permission was required to have the trees felled, and we are legally bound to replace them. Needless to say, we would always have done this. To improve the situation further I am proposing we replace the felled trees with more trees than were felled. We are already discussing the Ash trees replacements, and a list of suitable UK native trees has been compiled. During the summer the Parish Council will schedule meetings with interested parties to discuss appropriate trees and locations with a view to planting them in the Autumn. We plan to make the list of trees available to parishioners soon, and it will be good to get your feedback on which of them you would like to see included as replacements. These replacements will not be small saplings but more mature specimens, potentially four or five feet plus.

As a consequence of the tree felling, the lovely view of the **Blackdown Hills** can now be seen from all over the open area on the Triangle. Any future trees may be planted in such a way as to preserve the view.

Thank you for your understanding of the rationale for having to do this. It is a great shame, but Ash Dieback will change the look of the countryside all over the UK forever. It is important we choose the replacement trees wisely.

Somerset Bus Partnership: The £2 Bus Fare Extended Until The End Of June



The **Somerset Bus Partnership** has welcomed the government's decision to provide an additional £75 million. This will enable bus operators to continue to cap their single adult bus fares at £2. The £2 flat fare introduced in January is now set to continue through to the end of June. Bus users in Somerset will be able to continue to travel on most bus routes in the county and beyond for just £2.

It's worth remembering that this initiative applies to **cross-boundary services**, which means you can travel for example from Taunton to Minehead or Taunton to Dulverton for just £2. It's hoped this will persuade even more people to travel by bus, whether that's for work, education, shopping or medical treatments, saving money at a time when many households are suffering from the rising cost of living.

The 13 operators involved in the scheme are: ATWEST, Bakers Dolphin, Community Transport (South West) Ltd, Dartline, Faresaver Buses, First South West (Buses of Somerset), First West of England, Hatch Green Coaches, FromeBus, Libra Travel, Mendip Community Transport, Somerset County Council and South West Coaches. In addition, **Somerset County Council** has introduced within **Taunton** a special $\pounds 1$ single/ $\pounds 2$ return bus fare. Plus, there are new night time bus services with the last bus leaving the towns and villages covered by the scheme between 10.00pm and 11.15pm. The bus routes that will have a night service are:

- 1: Taunton to Priorswood/Musgrove Park/Silk Mills Park and Ride
- 21: Bridgwater to Taunton (Bridgwater Bus Station to Musgrove Park)
- 22: Wellington to Taunton
- 28: Minehead to Taunton (including Cotford St Luke and Norton Fitzwarren)
- 30: Chard to Taunton

This is funded by Somerset's successful bid for government money through its **Bus Service Improvement Plan**. Somerset Bus Partnership welcomes this further initiative and is encouraging Somerset to bid for further funding so this urban flat fare can be extended to other Somerset towns.

Help Needed

Somerset Bus Partnership is a voluntary organisation formed 2 years ago. It now has 150 'bus champions' and works with 125 Parish Councils across Somerset. It ensures the views of bus users are heard on what they need from bus services in our County. Key to the journey experience is easy access to bus information, improved bus stops and bus stations, and bus services that integrate with rail.

We are looking to expand the work of Somerset Bus Partnership over the next 12 months. However, we need more resource to help us do this: can you spare an hour a month to help?

Wivey Kitchen

registered charity (no.1201960)

Wivey Kitchen is a team of over 50 volunteers transforming surplus food into nutritious meals for local people facing food insecurity. It was formed during lockdown to serve an urgent need for food provision in the area. The charity has since delivered more than 50,000 meals, operating on little more than determination and goodwill. The cost-of-living crisis is exacerbating the existing problems and the need for the services of Wivey Kitchen is becoming more widespread. At the same time the running costs are climbing rapidly!

At present the meals are delivered for free, with an option to donate, to elderly, frail, unwell, financially vulnerable people and anyone suffering a change of circumstance. There is no assessment system but anyone can self-refer by emailing foodproject@wiveycares.net. There are also freezers of cooked food in St Andrew's church in Wiviliscombe and St Michael's church in Milverton. Anyone hungry can take food from these freezers.

Although, Langford Budville Parish falls just outside Wivey Kitchen's current "10 parishes", the only constraint to parishioners benefiting from the scheme is the availability of volunteer drivers. To volunteer, please email info@wiveykitchen.org.

Up to now, the charity has relied on the goodwill of local organisations for the use of commercial kitchens. For the project to have a permanent home would be a gamechanger and the charity are starting a **200 club** to raise money to move to a site available to rent now.

Wivey Kitchen is looking for 200 people to donate £10 per month by direct debit or standing order to cover the increasing costs of operating. All donors will be entered into a monthly prize draw. For more details and to apply to join the 200 club please contact 200club@wiveykitchen.org.

Green Gardening Group:

The group had a varied and sociable meeting in the Martlet function room on Monday March 20th. As ever we're grateful to the staff there for the trouble they take to get the function room warm and ready for us. Ongoing activities included identifying a beautiful wide range of "what's out in the garden now "brought by Jackie. Brownie points for whoever knew Abraham-Isaac-Jacob, a naturalised relative of Borage. (Or perhaps the mobile phone helped).

The talk that followed was illustrated by the new mini projector belonging to the parish and available to all groups. The subject was aliens - invasive plants which have no diseases or predators and so grow out of control and damage natural ecosystems. The well-known nationwide ones like Himalayan Balsam are mostly beyond the control of individuals, but we can look out for those that are at the moment fairly rare but spreading, such as Three-cornered Leek, a real pest in Cornwall. We saw a sample from this plant found in Runnington, and noticed the unusual three-cornered flower stalk which gives it its name, and makes it easy to identify. Keep a look out! The talk generated wide discussion; hopefully we can also help the UK biodiversity loss by

recording and protecting the wild species we are lucky enough to have in the parish

We then had an entertaining quiz, devised by Sarah, matching pictures with names of common types of bee. Nobody's score was publicised, but it seemed from where I was sitting that not many people got 100%!

Lists of jobs for the season were circulated, and plants and seeds from the 'Bring and Share' table sorted and taken away. These have been popular features of the Greener Gardening Group from the start.

At the end of January, David Follett came to tell us about his Paralympic career which came about following a road traffic

accident in 2007 when he was just 18. He had treatment/rehab in Derriford Hospital & Salisbury Spinal Hospital, having suffered a spinal cord injury which has left him paralysed from the chest down. David told us about his journey following the accident; the day-to-day practicalities, getting a purpose-built flat and training to compete in Para-Badminton events, then getting married and having two children. He has competed in many national & international tournaments and carried the Olympic torch at Great Torrington for the 2012 Olympic Games. Para-badminton first featured in the games in 2020 and David hopes to compete in Paris in 2024. We all enjoyed his inspirational talk, and meeting his patient assistance dog, Tessie!

The following meeting had a Valentine's theme; members were invited to bring something relevant to enter into a competition. There were cakes, textiles, pictures, photos and poems; two members won prizes for their original poetry. The last February meeting was a coffee & chat with general knowledge quiz - it's amazing what you don't know!

On March 10th, 43 of us set off in a coach to Oakham Treasures in Portbury to

see eclectic collections of "stuff". There were tractors, cars, bikes and motorbikes, loads of tractor seats, many of which had been painted in different colours and toys, tools, cameras, fax machines, phones, board games, etc! A Bee Alert, Bee Walk

Sunday 18 June

I am sure you are well aware of the decline in wildlife in this, "one of the most nature-depleted countries in the world" according to David Attenborough. Admittedly, there are some bright spots. Beavers are slowing the flow. Butterflies like the Comma, the Purple Emperor and the Large Blue are flourishing. Blackcaps, Red Kites and Bitterns are on the increase. Otters in Somerset are doing well.

But the UK has lost half its insects and farmland birds in the last 50 years. Bees, and especially bumblebees, are in trouble. In January the UK Government decided to ignore its own expert advice for the third year running and also its claims at COP15, in allowing the use of some pesticides. A single teaspoon of the type called neonicotenoids can deliver a lethal dose to 1.25 billion bees and they can contaminate soil and water.

One feels helpless in the face of all this but we are planning a way of at least making our voices heard locally against this decision and this decline. Bumblebees have wide appeal and would certainly make an attractive symbol to help get the message across. So it's a **Bee Alert, Bee Walk, on Sunday 18th June.**

The **Wildlife Trust** have helpfully offered partnership on this, dealing with insurance and publicity to their members.

A linear walk aims to emphasise the need for wildlife corridors. It will start at Wiveliscombe. taking in Milverton, Langford Budville and Runnington and end at Fox's Field in Tonedale. People could join and leave at each village and any interesting wildlife and plants could be recorded on the way. Children will be particularly welcome and school classes can do preparatory tasks. There might also be mini-workshops at the start and in the other villages, making flags or other items to show what the walk is about. It could give voice not just to the crisis about bees but to the whole area of the decline in nature and by extension to the climate emergency.

Wellbeing: Complementary Healthcare

I am defining "Complementary Healthcare" as any health intervention that is in addition to or, supports, the current orthodox approach to healthcare. We are all aware that the NHS is under pressure and our current "orthodox" approach has shifted from a personal patient-GP relationship to a disease-focused referral system and an emphasis on pharmaceutical drugs. Within the NHS, there are many exceptions to pharmaceutical prescribing, as diverse as physiotherapy exercises, cognitive behavioural therapy and walking groups. However, there is very little preventative medicine currently available within the NHS and plenty of scope for therapists offering both preventative and complementary services outside the NHS. So, complementary health interventions can range from dietary advice and exercise classes to herbal medicine and osteopathy.

We all have a tricky relationship with paying for our healthcare. Very few of us expect to have free meditation retreats or chiropractic treatment and we pay small fortunes to have our pets checked over! However, it can be difficult to earn a living providing care services because, as a society, we have become used to the dogma of a free NHS, there to provide all the care we require. Some complementary treatments overlap with overstretched NHS services (like physiotherapy) whilst others might be either instead of or in addition to pharmaceutical pills (like herbal medicine). Green Fingers: Seeds

This is sometimes seen as a bit of tricky area with a lot of dos and don'ts attached to it, but in reality a seed has been produced by its parent plant to ensure another generation, and given the right conditions, is hard wired to grow. Until then a seed must remain dormant, so dry, cool conditions, an airtight box in the salad drawer of the fridge or a cool dark space in the house are best. A potting bench in the green house with variable temperature, and damp is not so good.

Some seeds require a period of cold (vernalisation), some need to be sown when freshly harvested such as the Horse Chestnut. Best advice is to follow the sowing time on the packet, but with a dash of common sense. If it says March, but there's snow on the ground or it's bitterly cold it's unlikely to be successful.

Seed packets generally advise how long the seeds will remain viable, and the number of seeds that germinate usually decreases with the age of the seed. It's often worth giving it a go, but don't wait too long before you sow fresh seed if nothing germinates.

Seeds don't require a fertile compost so sowing into seed compost works best: they have all they need to germinate contained within them. Sow at the depth advised, then put your seed tray or pot into a tray of water to soak from the bottom up. This prevents the seeds being washed to one side by a torrent from the watering can.

Place your seed trays somewhere with the correct temperature and light levels for the plant. If it says 18 to 23 degrees they're not going to germinate in the green house in February. If it says in the dark pop them in a cupboard or cover them: each seed needs it's own correct conditions to germinate. Once your seedlings are up and have got two leaves you move on to thinning them out, pricking them out, potting on and hardening off before planting out, but perhaps that's for another time!

The same is true if direct sowing in the garden. Make sure that where you are sowing your seeds the tilth is fine enough so the seeds come in contact with soil, not big pockets of air between large clods. Watering the drill before you sow is a good plan with finer seed.

Seasonal Treats:

Anchovy and Kale Pasta

In these days of rising inflation I'm sure I'm not the only one who is trying to save money. This dish ticks a lot of boxes. For one, it is a quick, one pot meal. Secondly, it is predominantly made with store cupboard ingredients. Thirdly, it is endlessly adaptable and finally, it is cheap and nutritious. If anchovies are not your thing, why not use chorizo or smoked bacon lardons instead. If you don't have cavolo nero, use any other cabbage or shredded sprouts. Enough to serve four.

Ingredients:

300g orichette or other pasta
4 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
2 slices of stale bread, blitzed into
breadcrumbs
1 fat red chilli, thinly sliced
5 fat garlic cloves, crushed
8-10 anchovies, chopped small
200g cavolo nero, chopped
1 lemon, zested and juiced
Plenty of grated parmesan



Method

Boil pasta in plenty of salted water

Whilst pasta is cooking, add 1 tbsp oil to large frying pan and fry breadcrumbs until brown and crispy. Remove to a plate and wipe pan with kitchen paper

Add another 2 tbsp of oil and add garlic, chilli and anchovies to pan and fry over a gently heat for a couple of minutes

About a minute before pasta is cooked, add cavolo nero to the pan and boil for 1-2 mins

Reserving a mugful of pasta water, drain pasta and add it to the frying pan with the anchovy mixture. Over a medium heat, cook until combined, adding pasta water as required, and the lemon zest and juice.

Check seasoning and serve topped with crispy breadcrumbs, the remaining tbsp of olive oil and grated parmesan.

PS - I recommend not skipping the fried breadcrumbs. They give a lovely texture to the dish



The Church Loo

In 2013 it was decided that we needed a loo at the church, and **The Friends of St Peters** formed to raise funds for this. The Friends organised a range of functions, and the 'Save a penny to spend a penny' campaign: a jam-jar army which raised the impressive total of £1169.

Costs however escalated with planning rules dictating that there had to be disabled access, and with cost inflation. Planning permission was needed both from the Parish and the Diocese and was costly and time-consuming, so it has taken almost ten years to complete. The loo may only be open when there is a function at the church (a condition of planning permission).



The positioning was chosen as the best option taking into account access needs and historical requirements. The expense of connecting to mains drainage would have put it out of reach, and so it is a composting toilet: It is accessible, spacious and well finished inside and out. After a time and some judicious planting it will blend in well. The lighting is solar, and it is very well insulated.

We still need to raise more funds to cover the full costs: Hopefully parish residents will continue to support these efforts as it will be to the benefit of all. It will be particularly appreciated at weddings and funerals when guests often arrive from a distance.

Learning Outside the Classroom

How do we learn best? What a huge question this is, and one that continues to challenge generation upon generation of educators. One leading principle is to take the learning outside the classroom and to deliver lessons in

We are grateful for the ongoing support that the parish gives us, from our long relationship with the church (172 years so far!), to being able to participate in the planting of the Jubilee Wood at Langford Lakes. The children love getting involved in local events and meeting local people like those who come to watch our church services and Christmas plays. Our school, we hope, brings a richness to parish life, just as the people of the parish enrich the education of our pupils.

We are particularly grateful for the people working to make the **Triangle** more biodiverse, safer, and more accessible for children and those with mobility issues. We have been up there almost weekly, following the turn of the seasons as the snowdrops, lesser celandine and daffodils bloom. We saw the first Lords and Ladies flower this week, and can't wait to enjoy the bluebells and the wildflowers that we planted with the conservation group last year.

Along with our nature studies, as a part of our outside learning. we have been practising our Ordnance Survey mapping skills, firelighting, wool-bombing, base-building, and green woodwork (using knives, bow saws and drills), as well as learning how to roast the perfect marshmallow and make the best hot chocolate! Hopefully, we will soon be able to set up an orienteering course on the Triangle - something all members of the public can come and enjoy! So, if you see us out and about, do stop and say hello. We'II love to talk to you about our learning and perhaps learn a little from you in return. Even better, why not come into school - we welcome parishioners who would like to give an hour to listen to our children read or who might be interested in supporting our school in other ways.


