News from the Villages:

Langford Budville Parish Council

We wanted to tell you about some recent changes on the Parish Council, and also about our finances and future intentions. A number of new faces have joined the PC. Currently there are four co-opted councillors: **Derek Sowden** (Chairperson); Juliet Shrimpton; Julian Kupfer; and Theresa Jacoby. The PC Clerk, Helen Chadwick, provides financial regulation, legal and procedural advice and is a position required by law. We meet once a month in open forum, which means any parishioner can attend. It's a good opportunity to bring to our attention anything anyone believes needs to be rectified, but this can also be done by email to the parish clerk (below).

The PC is responsible for a number of essential services, all financed by the receipt of an **annual precept** from Somerset County Council. In 2021/22 we received £8500. Major outgoings include £3208 - clerk salary/expenses; £2899 - grass cutting and emptying of dog bins. We have installed a new bench on the Triangle and replaced a damaged fingerpost at a total cost of £2178, plus we have many other essential fees to satisfy. The felling of potentially dangerous ash trees continues to hit our finances hard, making it all a major juggling act. One huge success has been the receipt of £11000 to initiate the **Greener Langford Budville** project, which the PC whole-heartedly supports.

Now COVID restrictions have eased we would like to restart maintenance jobs such as litter picking, and we are also looking at tree planting, and developing a virtual Parish notice board. If you feel willing to contribute in any way, or you would like to join the team as a councillor, then please let us know. Our County and District councils have declared a climate emergency, and your PC will be supporting any important initiatives.

We would definitely struggle without the support of a number of groups and individuals. Zenah Rowe walks the local paths reporting any issues and David Faulkner greatly assists with our website. New support groups have arisen e.g. Tim Dyer (tree warden/Triangle working party), Ian and Christine Loudon (conservation/sustainable garden groups), Josh Wedderkopp (communications/events management). If you feel willing to contribute in any way then please do let us know.

Langford Budville PC has a new, enthusiastic and determined team. We want to be at the heart of the community and work more collaboratively with all village groups towards building a community for everyone to be proud of.

Farewell and Welcome

Farewell John Norvell

It was with great sadness that we learnt of John's death in October following a long and bravely fought illness.

Jim and Maggie Norvell moved to Runnington in 1981 when John was eight. He attended Langford Budville school before moving on to Courtfields School, and from there he went to Lancaster University where he gained a degree in Environmental Chemistry. While at university he met Mandy, his future wife, who now teaches maths at Kingsmead School in Wiveliscombe.

After graduating John got a job with CRE, an offshoot of the old Coal Board, monitoring emissions from combustion units such as cement works, oil refineries and waste incineration plants. This work took him to Pakistan, Nigeria, Algeria and Greece, not to enjoy the usual tourist sites but to measure pollution.

John and Mandy with their two sons, Kai and Finley, eventually moved back to Wellington. Both boys attended Langford Budville Primary School, and John took an active part in supporting the school while they were there.

Settled in Wellington, John helped his parents run their very successful fruit farm.

His skill as a strawberry picker had been spotted by the Osbornes when, as a schoolboy, they had employed him as their star strawberry picker, always to be relied upon to pop down on his bike at a moment's notice to pick an unexpected order.

John bore his illness remarkably stoically, never letting his increasingly poor health dampen his courage and enjoyment of life. A few weeks before his death, having been given a terminal diagnosis, he decided to have as much fun as he could with his family and friends. A short camping holiday was followed by an early Christmas party for eighty guests organised by his friends complete with a Christmas tree, crackers, and a full



Christmas meal - an occasion full of merriment and courage. As John himself said, his life was full of quality if not of quantity. John died peacefully aged 48, with his family around him.

Maggie Norvell was for several years a valued part of the Round About Team and a parish councillor. Our deepest sympathy and admiration for their courage goes to her, Jim, Mandy and all the family. John was much loved and he will be missed by all who knew him.

News from the Village Hall

The Hall is being well used at present and is hosting a rich range of activities each month including fitness, yoga, art, bridge, Pilates, dance, jazz and film. We are pleased that the school will hold their Christmas production there on Friday 10 December. Sadly, we are not hosting the usual Christmas fair on account of lingering Covid concerns.

A big thanks to Tim Seddon who has organised for the car park lighting to be improved and for the external rear spotlight to be fixed. We have also tried to fix the potholes on the drive, which were calming traffic a bit too enthusiastically.

Inside the hall we are starting to plan for a new floor covering and a new sound system next year. The current floor has always been an interim arrangement and a hangover from the construction phase and has been kept going by periodic teams of volunteer decorators. Improvements to the sound system will be designed by our very own guru – Tim Wyatt – and will hopefully tie up with a future broadband connection to allow us to live-stream events in future.

Separately, Juliet Shrimpton has initiated a sustainability group to assess how we can lighten our footprint on a range of fronts including the energy that we consume and the products that we use.

With the events sub-committee and the Parish council we are beginning to plan for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations in June, and later in the year in September for a more modest event - the 10th anniversary of the Jubilee Hall.

The Hall will be closed between 19 December and 2 January. We wish you a very Happy Christmas,

News from the Villages

Parish Council - summary of last meeting

Cllr Wren presented his update, including further details on the move to one **Unitary Authority** to be branded **Somerset Council**. The decision on election dates and changes to election boundaries is due by the end of November. Following a question from the members of public present, Cllr Hunt gave further detail on increased workload vs existing services, short term vs long term cost benefits. Cllr Wren added that there will be understandable staff uncertainty at present.

Cllr Hunt gave the latest figures on **Covid in Somerset**, and updated that Somerset has one of the highest vaccination rates in the country, but also currently one of the highest infection rates. He also gave details on a £4.1m **Climate Emergency Fund** to de-carbonise public buildings including County Hall.

Greener Langford Budville: Hannah Montag is working on the biodiversity audit. The contract for the travel feasibility study is due to be finalised imminently.

Triangle: Quotes have been requested from more suppliers in accordance with best purchasing practice. Due to the accessibility issues, size and proximity to the highway it is essential this is done professionally and there is likely to be a significant cost. The mowing plan was circulated, aiming to tender for next year's grass cutting early in the New Year. Plan to be circulated in Roundabout magazine in early spring. A new forest shade area and wildflower meadow are planned. The loose matting for the playground area has been ordered and will be fixed in advance of the play equipment inspection.

The draft terms of reference for the **Events Group** were agreed unanimously. A draft Events Calendar has been circulated. Jubilee ideas discussed include a **Street Party** and a suggestion by the footpath warden for a **Jubilee footpath**.

There being no requests to Somerset West & Taunton for an election, it was agreed to co-opt candidates to fill P.C. vacancies. Theresa Jacoby was elected unanimously. A separate committee meeting is planned to discuss and agree the vision and strategy for the council for the future.

Councillors reviewed the draft **Parish Council Sustainability Commitment** circulated with the summons to this meeting. Comments to be sent to all Shrimpton.

Update on **Footpaths/Bridlepaths/Rights of Way/Signposts**: Blocked drains have been reported. The Clerk will contact Rights of Way Officer to discuss accessibility issues on the footpath from opposite the Church to Runnington.

Planning: The Council's comments on applications No 21/21/0023, No 21/21/0024/T and 21/21/0025 were agreed as circulated in advance of the meeting.

It was agreed to discuss flooding at Chipley, new year litter picks and a proposal from a parishioner re Community Council at the next meeting.

Conservation Group: Tree Planting

Somerset Bus Partnership

Somerset has the second lowest number of bus journeys per head in the UK having fallen some 43% over the last decade, a result of public transport not being a priority for the County Council. We sought the parish's view in an earlier Roundabout and the PC contributed to SCC's bid to the Government's **Bus Back Better** strategy via the Somerset Bus Partnership and the council itself.

The Partnership is still looking for local representatives to work with them, especially if you have a knowledge of the transport sector and a real desire to get involved. The PC is liaising with **Wiveliscombe Town Council's** representative as we believe it will benefit both communities and give us a stronger voice in this important initiative - we would all benefit from a proper bus service and transport is the biggest CO2 emitter in Somerset, some 44% of our total emissions.

The 12 Days of Christmas

The carol we know as **The Twelve Days of Christmas** is very familiar to us all with its catchy tune and lyrics. It was penned in its current format in 1909 by Frederick Austin, but it appears to be based on old 'cumulative verse' games of memory-or-forfeit: One person would lead with the first line and all had to repeat this: the leader would add another line and round it would go again, with the number of lines, and the speed increasing each time. Anyone making a mistake would have to drop out or pay a forfeit – a kiss or a favour of some sort. It would have been spoken rather than sung.

The verses in the modern version date back to a 1780 children's book, *Mirth without Mischief*, but there is some evidence that the game goes back even earlier and may originate from Tyneside or perhaps France. Other musical forms have existed, but the Austin version has captured our imagination and survived. It was often sung during the twelfth night celebration by family groups, one person leading, and then going round the circle. Each person had to correctly repeat the lines – or pay a forfeit if they made a mistake.

The lyrics have varied with time and place, and there is no religious meaning to them, other than the reference to the *Twelve Days of Christmas*. Attempts to assign them meaning as Christian lessons or catechisms have no foundation it seems – the verses are just secular nonsense. There are some suggestions that most of the birds referred to were game birds that would have been eaten as part of a feast in Mediaeval times.

In Western Christian theology, the Twelve Days of Christmas start on **Christmas Day** (25 December) and continue up to **Twelfth Night** (6 January) or **Epiphany**. That is believed to be the time between the birth of Christ on Christmas Day, and the arrival of the Wise Men. Epiphany is regarded in some Christian traditions as the more important festival when gifts would be given.

Different versions have appeared through time. The gift giver in the verse has been variously "My Mother" and "My True Love". The partridge has been a peacock at times, and the tree a Juniper Tree. The most variable line seems to have been the **Four Calling Birds** – originally they were "Collie or Coley birds" – i.e. coal-black birds or blackbirds, but they've also been "Canary Birds" or "Coloured Birds'. The Lords a-leaping have also been Bells a-ringing and so on.

Similar lists exist from several regions, including Scotland, Sweden and the Faroe Islands, and there is a French version which refers to days of the year with similar counting and repetition, but rather different objects. The old Scottish version has the King gifting his Lady with an assortment of creatures including an Arabian Baboon! Here the numbers don't increase, and there are thirteen gifts.

We have shifted our village 'twelve days' to before Christmas as many of us will be away! This is an experiment, and maybe next year we can be a bit more ambitious and go for a village "Advent Calendar" - we'd need 24 people to volunteer to decorate windows for that!

Apple Day at Runnington

Jane Lloyd went down with her family and lots of apples: Here's what she had to say...

We had a lovely time. First Fiona and family (Emmy 5, Isla 3 and Jack 18 months, Chris, my husband Richard and I) picked the apples in the orchard, and put them in the trailer. We took the apples down to the yard, washed them under the tap and piled them into various buckets, bins etc.

We then took these down to Runnington where very kindly Hannah, Paul and son Rufus, along with Josh, Juliet, Maia and Robin had set up the equipment. There was an old-fashioned wooden

apple press there, and also a much larger 'up to date' version.



With the old press we needed to quarter/cut up the apples first. We then put them into the top of the press, which was lined with a cloth filter. Turning the handle crushed the apples and forced the pulp through the filter. Pure apple juice ran out at the bottom into prepared bottles.

With the large electric machine, whole apples were thrown into the top. The top half was like a large funnel. The apples were all squashed/chopped up and zoomed down into a bucket. We then took this pulp to an apple press, which squeezed out the juice and pumped it through some plastic tubing, which was connected to two metal taps where you placed/held your bottles to be filled. Once filled and tops screwed on they were pasteurised.

We all loved the experience—Jane Lloyd

The exercise netted more than 250 bottles of apple juice, all pasteurised. These will be available to buy at £3.00 per bottle at various community events like the **School Nativity**, and the **Biodiversity Launch**.







Living Well: DIY Christmas Gifts

For many of us, our views and values have shifted over the last two years and a common theme emerging this Christmas is "make your own gifts"; fun to do and a real treat for the recipient. If this is something you fancy having a go at, here are a few simple options and some websites with more ideas.

Homemade truffles are delicious and look amazing. They consist of a basic recipe of chocolate, butter and cream but can then be flavoured and rolled in a variety of coatings to produce a stunning gift. For a full recipe go to **Seasonal Treats** on page 25.

Or how about some **essential oil candles**? Melt some candle wax chips in a thick glass jar in the microwave and add 20 drops of your favourite essential oil. Add the wick and hold it in place with a stick across the top until the wax sets. Decorate with ribbons and a seasonal holly sprig. These **spicy coated nuts** from *Country Living* are really tasty and very easy. Combine 750g cashews, pecans, and almonds in a bowl. Coat them in 3 egg whites whisked with 2 tbsp. water for about 1 minute until frothy, then roll in a mixture of 4 tsp cinnamon, 1tsp cayenne, 1½tsp salt, 250g granulated sugar and bake between sheets of parchment in the oven at 150°C until golden (20-30 mins, turning halfway). Leave to cool and put in an airtight glass jar with a ribbon around it.

If you have run out of time to make sloe gin/vodka there are many ways to flavour vodka quickly for a festive treat. To make **chai vodka** combine 750 ml vodka, 3 cinnamon sticks, 2 tsp chopped candied ginger, 12 black peppercorns, 10 whole cloves, and 10 cardamom pods. Cover and let stand for a week. Strain and decant into a nice bottle with a decorated label. Good Housekeeping

GreenFingers: Bare root trees

The description "bare root" literally means a plant that is removed from the ground for sale rather than grown in a pot and this is the time to plant them: great for the plants and great for the pocket! Deciduous plants are lifted whilst they are dormant, i.e. they've dropped their leaves for the winter. This is much less of a shock for them compared with being moved when they are busy growing leaves, flowers or seeds. They also won't need endless watering during the cooler wet months! Planting instructions should come with the plants, and there's plenty of advice on the web.

Trees, fruit bushes and hedging are all commonly planted as bare root specimens and unusual varieties are often only available as bare root plants. We have found **Adams Apples** at Payhembury is a great specialist fruit nursery. There is a wealth of choice covering appearance, fruit keeping qualities, soil compatibility and disease resistance. Most suppliers will be happy to help with advice over the phone. Some fruit suppliers, such as **Charlton Orchards** at Creech St Michael, have less familiar 'keeping' apples available for sale now if you want to taste them before buying.

If you are thinking of planting a deciduous hedge, now is the time. Hedge plants are typically sold in bundles at approximately £1 per plant. The 30-80cm high specimens look deceptively insignificant. Our little wood on the footpath by the river near Harpford Bridge is only four years old, but some of the trees are now 6m or more. The hedge along the footpath is only three years old and it's over 3m tall! There are several local suppliers, such as **Triscombe Nurseries** on the Quantocks and **Perrie Hale Nursery** near Honiton.

If you have any mass planting of borders to do, bare root stock is by far the most economical choice. Many deciduous plants are available as bare roots. Roses are best planted now, as are many peonies. Some other possibilities are sea holly, astilbe, hardy geranium and agapanthus.

Food Pantry update:

Steve Jenkins gave an overview of the Food Pantry scheme. More and more Food Pantries are being set up around the country, the idea being that those who are on low income can access some food quite cheaply. Clients sign up for a specific period of time, pay so much per week, and are able to access food worth up to several times the amount they have paid in. Clients will need to live within easy walking distance of their local Pantry. The food they obtain is getting to the end of its sell by/use by date, and is provided by a company called Fareshare. This food would otherwise go into landfill. Bob House is heading up a plan to set one up, which is planned to be based at RGCC. He has possibly someone who would be able to manage it, but volunteers are needed to help run it. It would be open one day per week for limited hours.

What day will your birthday be on in ten years?

You need to know the year, month and day of the month. You need the special numbers listed below. And you need to follow the steps.

Here are the steps, with an example to test it out.

I know my daughter was born on Wednesday October 1st 1986.

Let's check it was a Wednesday

Steps	Example
Step 1: Take the last two digits of the year (1986)	86
Step 2: Divide this by 4 and ignore any remainder $(86/4 = 21 \text{ rem } 2)$	21
Step 3: Find the Month Number (October)	1
Step 4: Add the day number (1st) to the numbers found in Steps 1 to 3.	1 + 86 + 21 + 1 = 109
Step 5: Divide the answer by 7. If the remainder is 0, use 7 for the remainder number $$	109/7 = 15 rem 4
Step 6: Find the century number	0
Step 7: Add the remainder number from Step 5 to the Century Number	4+0=4
Step 8: Match this number to a day on the Day Number chart	4 = It's Wednesday!

Hmmm? I wonder how that works?

Seasonal Treats: Chocolate Truffles

These are relatively easy to make but are quite messy! They are seriously delicious and make a great gift at Christmas, but be prepared for you and your kitchen to be covered in chocolate. The core recipe is very simple: chocolate, butter and cream. You can then roll them in, or add whatever flavourings you wish, or even add a bit of your favourite tipple. This recipe is for "dark chocolate" lovers, I prefer them with a bit less cocoa.

Ingredients:

225g good quality Belgian dark chocolate (at least 70% Cocoa).
180 ml whipping cream
1 tbsp unsalted butter (room temp)
½ tsp vanilla extract
Toppings: Sprinkles, cocoa powder, crushed nuts, crushed chocolate
2 tbsp liqueur (optional)

Method

Chop the chocolate finely (or use a food processor). Transfer the chocolate into a glass Pyrex bowl. Place the butter on top of the chocolate in small pieces.

Warm the cream until it is <u>just</u> starting to simmer (keep stirring throughout to prevent it sticking). Pour the hot cream over the chocolate and add the vanilla extract (or any other flavourings/liqueur of your choice).

Leave to stand for 5 minutes.

After 5 minutes mix well. If all the chocolate has not melted place the bowl over a pan of simmering water and stir until all the chocolate is melted. Pour the chocolate into a flat, shallow dish and cover with cling film directly on the surface of the chocolate to prevent condensation. Place in the fridge for 1 - 2 hours until it is firm.

This is the messy bit;-). Use a tablespoon to scoop out balls of the mixture and roll them between your palms. Then coat the balls in the toppings of your choice. (If the balls have become too soft you can refrigerate them for 20 minutes before adding the toppings. Conversely if the toppings won't stick roll them in your hands for longer.)


Pop them on some crumpled tissue paper in a clean recycled box, add a ribbon, and they will make the perfect gift. (But be sure to add a note saying "**store in the fridge for up to 3 days only**" - they do <u>not</u> contain preservatives!)

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
